Our rabbis teach in Pirkei Avot that fifty is the "age at which one has enough life experience to give others counsel." It's hard to believe that we just celebrated Etz Chaim turning fifty at our superb gala.

Fifty years ago, Chuck Bernstein may have been the only Jew living in Cobb County. According to the last Federation A study, there are between 15,000-20,000 Jews who make Cobb County their home. Our synagogue is thriving. After fifty years in the business, what advice might we have to give to others? What have we been doing right that the rest of the world can learn from us based on our life experience?

Fifty years ago, a generation of extraordinary visionaries built a synagogue. There were many challenging decisions to make in those early years. But in their wisdom, they decided to make our community traditional and egalitarian, reflecting the direction that the Jewish world was headed.

Our founding president, Stephen King, talked about the importance of "pediatric Judaism." Even as our congregation has grown into a proudly multigenerational family, we continue to see it as mission-critical to bring the next generation of Jews into our ranks. Visitors and prospective families in our community continue to be in awe of the involvement of our kids: from leading evening minyan to our flourishing youth group community.

Our bimah is democratic and far from performative. We value the beautiful voices in our community, but no one leader gets a monopoly. Past President Scott Rittenberg once referred to Etz Chaim as a co-op. There is little top-down lay leadership here. Nothing successful ever happens here without a few of us willing to get our hands dirty to make it happen.

Our synagogue remains a thoughtful place when it comes to making change. In a world where things are moving a mile a minute, we patiently strategize and think things through. We are thoughtful about how we do what is best for our collective community.

At the same time, during my tenure, Etz Chaim has truly become an inclusive community. We are responsive to the changing needs of the Jewish world. We have grown into a community that embraces Jews of all backgrounds who want to learn about our philosophy. Our sanctuary project in our Renewal 2020 Campaign intentionally reflects this desire as we welcome people of all abilities and kinds to daven alongside us.

Over the past fifty years, our synagogue, alongside Cobb County, has flourished. We've had a Jewish chair of the Cobb County Commission and currently have a Jewish councilmen in Marietta. Etz Chaim is supported and respected by our non-Jewish neighbors. Our members play an active role in our synagogue, civic organizations and the greater Jewish community. Our Shabbat community is growing and our future is assuredly bright.

I know that it sounds like bragging, but I love my shul. And I suspect we'll have even more advice to give to the world when we are flourishing fifty years from today.

On an extremely rainy Sunday, April 6th, I had the privilege of leading a group of students from 8th through 12th grade and many of their parents to Selma and Montgomery, Alabama, for a Civil Rights trip that was generously funded by a JTEEN grant from Federation.

We started in Selma at Temple Mishkan Israel, the only synagogue in Selma. One of their life-long members, Ronnie Leet, was kind enough to open their gorgeous building for us and teach us about their synagogue, the nearest to the start of the famous 1965 March from Selma to Montgomery, in which Martin Luther King, Jr., marched next to Rabbi Abraham Joshua Heschel. We found out that the synagogue's official policy was neutral. There were members on both sides of the issue, but it was quite intense when Ronnie pointed at a seat in the front row and described it as the regular seat of a member who had his rifle taken from him as he approached the Edmund Pettus Bridge the morning of the March.

Fortunately, the rain lightened up enough for us to experience what Heschel called praying with his feet, as our group walked across the Edmund Pettus Bridge, just as King, Heschel, John Lewis, and so many more did 60 years ago.

In Montgomery, we visited The Legacy Museum, a series of powerful exhibits chronicling the slave trade, the Jim Crow era, and the Civil Rights movement with a special focus on the 1955 bus boycott begun by Rosa Parks. After we left the museum, we stopped by the Church at which King was the pastor from 1954 until 1960, and the building of Kahl Montgomery, an antebellum Reform temple dedicated in 1862, which is now a church. We also visited the bus stop made famous by Rosa Parks before stopping for dinner and returning home to Marietta.

This trip was particularly meaningful for me because I got to share not only historical information with our participants but some primary source material as well. My grandparents were very much involved in the integration of the business district in Rome, Georgia, in the early 1960s. I shared some of their recollections with the group, thanks to an audio memoir they provided, and I was able to honor my grandfather's memory and share the lesson that all of the work they did for Civil Rights was because of, in his words, "the basic Jewish value of human dignity". In the memoir, he charges his children and grandchildren to remember the stories he and my grandmother told and, again, references Jewish values as his motivation. I know that by bringing members of the younger generation on this trip, I was able to fulfill his wishes as I instilled that knowledge in students from our own Etz Chaim community. I recently participated in a rehearsal for a major event my company runs each year. The emcee and speakers were walking through their scripts and slides, while the marketing and communications teams gave feedback. One leader who I haven't had the chance to work with before really stood out. She took charge of the feedback process, and every single thing she said made total sense and went beyond the usual feedback areas.

When I complimented her on her approach and asked how she does it, she told me: "Most people listen to what's being said and what they're seeing. I've trained myself to look at the opposite - what isn't being said, and what aren't we seeing?" By focusing on what's left unsaid or unnoticed, she could pick up on gaps, subtle cues, and opportunities that others might miss. It wasn't just about being a better communicator, but about recognizing the deeper layers of human interaction.

This mindset doesn't just apply to big presentations; it's useful in everyday life, too. When we talk to people, especially in today's divided world, it's easy to focus on the surface: the words we say, the gestures we make, or the things we post on social media. But what about what's beneath all that? What aren't we saying, and what aren't we seeing? Those quiet spaces can often hold the most important insights.

We all know conversations can quickly become polarized these days. Learning to pay attention to what's not being said can help us connect on a deeper level. It helps us tune in to the emotions and struggles that drive people's words - or silence. It's a form of empathy: being able to see beyond the surface and recognize the real human experience underneath. When we do that, we make our conversations more meaningful, and we're able to connect with people in a much more authentic way.

So, the next time you're in a conversation, whether it's in a meeting, with family, or at a Kiddush lunch, try listening for more than just the words. Pay attention to what's not being said, the pauses, the body language, and those little cues that might reveal something deeper. You might be surprised by how much more you understand, and how much richer the conversation can be.

At a Shabbat kiddush that I attended around the time of my first Memorial Day here at Etz Chaim, Fred Davis z"I stopped me and asked if I knew the origin of Memorial Day.

My first thoughts were:

I grew up in New Jersey. Memorial Day has always been considered the unofficial start of summer. Daily, Weekly and Seasonal Beach Passes must be purchased. Parking meters are reinstalled, and quarters are stashed in the car. The smell of anything fried starts wafting through the air. Beach supplies and suntan lotion double in price. The Garden State Parkway is in permanent bumper to bumper traffic. But I knew that that was not what he was looking for.

I sat down and told him it was my understanding that the original name was Decoration Day and that it was started to honor Civil War soldiers who had died in battle. The holiday's name evolved to Memorial Day, with the federal government officially adopting the name in 1967. He seemed shocked that I knew the answer.

The important thing, regardless of the official name is that we honor and remember the men and women who gave the ultimate sacrifice to insure our Freedom and Democracy. Sometimes we struggle to remember the origin of something that has been around for so long, but not the really important things.

On April 27, we celebrated our 50th Anniversary as the first Conservative synagogue in the Atlanta area outside the perimeter.

We continue to "create meaningful Jewish experiences" even as the area around us has grown and changed. Change is inevitable, but purpose and mission remain.

For 50 years we have honored our mission statement and followed our North Star:

Our Mission: A dynamic, egalitarian, Conservative synagogue, steeped in tradition, nestled in Marietta, that provides meaningful Jewish experiences in welcoming, engaging environment. We provide:

Inspiring religious services. Educational, social and cultural activities, serving multi-generational needs. A caring community that supports each other through both joyful and challenging life cycle events. Connections with the broader community and opportunities for Tikun Olam.

I am proud to be here and be a member of this extraordinary congregation.

May we continue to stand the test of time.


Wrapping Up the Year

We're finishing up the year and are so proud of what our students have learned and what we've accomplished. One of the main areas for change this year was our middle school curriculum. We introduced the Holocaust for both 6th and 7th grades and received helpful feedback from our students. Our Kitah Zayinists (7th graders) continued their unit of study on Jewish Atlanta with visits to and/or speakers from MACoM (the Metro Atlanta Community Mikvah at B'nai Torah), the Chutzpah and Holocaust exhibits at the Breman Museum, and Dressler's Jewish Funeral Care.

As we moved into the new calendar year, the Zayinists learned about the Jewish Youth Promise, part of the Jewish Future Promise, an organization with a global initiative that invites Jews and their allies to make a moral commitment: to ensure that their legacy, through both values and charitable giving, supports the Jewish people and the State of Israel. Our first step introduced the Jewish Youth Promise to the students in Kitah Zayin through a deep dive with enriching programming designed by leading Jewish educators to explore their Jewish identity through immersive experiences. Dr. Fox did a great job sharing the curriculum that includes sharing pivotal/impactful moments in their lives to help them connect to their meaningful Jewish moments. The students then created a promise to live Jewishly and wrote a digital letter to their future selves, sharing the impact they want to leave on the Jewish community. Then, they each made their "promise moment" immortal by saving a candid digital photo, marking the start of their commitment journey, and then sealed it in a digital time capsule.

Over the next two decades, participants receive biennial reminders of their promise and are gifted their letters every five years. We felt that the B'nai Mitzvah year is the perfect time for students to reflect on their Jewish experiences and take those moments to think about who they want to be as Jews over the next several decades. As they get older, looking back on their promise will allow them to see if they are still on a path to fulfilling their promise. WOULD A VISIT LIFT YOUR SPIRITS? Bikkur Cholim (Visiting the III)



EAST SIDE STUDENTS VISIT HOLOCAUST MEMORIAL GARDEN


hen the fifth-grade classes at East Side
Elementary completed their study section on
World War II, they were treated to a special field
trip—right across the street from the school.

Etz Chaim, the Conservative Jewish Synagogue celebrating its 50th year in East Cobb, invited the 230+ students to visit the congregation's Holocaust Memorial Garden and Children's Daffodil Garden to learn about Antisemitism in the historical context that led to the Holocaust.

The tours were led by synagogue Docents who were mentored by Kennesaw State University Holocaust Museum leaders to ensure age-appropriate education that meets Georgia standards on Holocaust education.

In addition to the somber Garden Memorial featuring six cut stones representing the 6 million Jews murdered during the Holocaust, students saw original artifacts that included actual cobblestones from the Warsaw Ghetto, railroad tracks that led to the Treblinka Concentration Camp and a 300-year old Torah scroll that was saved from destruction.

After a ceremonial planting in the Daffodil Garden, each student received a commemorative daffodil and an ID card featuring the photograph and story of a child victim of the Holocaust.
