I remember landing in Israel just hours before the start of Sukkot. Before heading to my apartment in Jerusalem, where I would be living for the year, I spent the holiday with my friend Arie (now Rabbi Arie Hasit) in his Tel Aviv apartment.

That first night, we walked to dinner at a friend's house. Like Arie, she was also a new olah to Israel. We ate outside on her patio. The patio had a permanent overhang, but she hung tapestries along the sides and added a few paper chains. She laughed as she admitted that it wasn't a kosher sukkah, but "for now, it's good enough."

I can still remember that moment, because at the time it bothered me. I had envisioned my year in Israel as one of unadulterated, perfect Jewish experiences. This wasn't it. After all, halakha is clear about what constitutes a sukkah: the roof must be temporary, open enough to see the stars, and uncovered by trees. And yet, here I was, eating my very first Sukkot meal in Israel in a space that clearly didn't measure up.

Over time, especially once I became a parent, I began to learn that there really is no such thing as unadulterated perfection. Amy and I even have a sign in our hallway that reads: "Please excuse the mess: we've stopped caring with each subsequent child."

Jewish law, like life, may set forth an ideal. But there's also wisdom in learning when to breathe, take a step back, and acknowledge: this is good enough.

The Mishnah in *Pesachim* offers a lesson in this regard. It teaches that one need not worry that a weasel might drag crumbs back into the house on Passover. Why? Because if you let your anxiety run unchecked, you will drive yourself mad. Taking a Q-tip to every crevice of your home may technically align with the ideal, but it misses the point: it strips the holiday of its joy.

Living in the South, I've come to appreciate the expression "giving a bout of grace." That young woman who had just moved to Israel built her sukkah under a permanent roof. So what? Imagine what courage it took for her to leave behind her family and start fresh in a new place. Context, after all, is often the first thing overlooked by an ideologue.

A Passover where the house isn't perfectly spotless. A Sukkot celebrated under a covered pavilion. A Shabbat dinner where pizza is delivered to the table. None of these are the Norman Rockwell ideal of Jewish observance. But they are real, lived Jewish moments.

As we step into Sukkot, remember that your sukkah doesn't need to be perfect. However you observe, do your best. There is an ideal, but more often than not, it is just fine, even holy, when it is "good enough."

Last year was the first time I had my own Sukkah!

I have great memories of spending time in Sukkot as a child. Tsimmes in my rabbi's sukkah was a particular highlight. It was usually pretty darn cold, though.

My parents, however, never wanted to build one—though I would frequently eat meals on the porch in our backyard. I went off to college and then to New York. But I never had a house, and none of my New York apartments had even a glimmer of somewhere to build a Sukkah. But now, I have a house with a back patio that's perfect for building one. So, with a bit of help, I put one together. It has a wooden frame, lattice walls, and two very modern components. Color-changing LED lights, and my personal favorite, a colorful paper chain.

I don't know why the paper chain is one of my favorite parts of a sukkah, but it absolutely is. Some of it probably has to do with the fact that I love colors. But maybe because there's something soothing and meditative about stapling the paper into chains, but that can't be the only thing - I used a foam "paper" that not only stands up to any rain, but I'll be able to use the exact same paper chain this year as I did last year! Although maybe I'll make some more, just because I can. And who can complain about the weather we have here during our fall holiday?

My other favorite thing about having a Sukkah was hosting meals throughout the holiday. No tsimmes, but I served dishes ranging from matzo ball soup (I use my grandmother's matzo ball recipe!) to burgers, I was able to share meals in my sukkah with many new friends.

As we approach Sukkot this year, I'm planning more festive meals in my Sukkah for this year, deciding what colors I'll set the LED lights to, and realizing that because I finally have my own Sukkah, Sukkot has a really good chance of becoming my new favorite holiday.

As I sit at my desk, I listen to the children sing holiday songs. They've dipped apples in honey; they have listened to the shofar blow. We are building sukkot and shaking our lulavim and etrogim. We march with the Torah and sing about our pride in being Jewish. But how do we make these feelings stay after the holidays have passed?

It is important to recognize that being Jewish is a feeling, too. It is a deep-rooted feeling of pride in being part of such a great people. To bring that sense of spirituality to preschoolers is not an easy task. However, Jewish Preschool may just be the one place where being Jewish is easy. It is fun to sing and dance while we praise God. It is enjoyable to taste the various foods and perform the various traditions. And it is easy to promote a sense of belonging when we are all together.

So how do we keep that feeling alive in the classrooms all year? We ensure that Jewish items are included among the toys in every class, including candlesticks, kippot, challah covers, and mezuzot displayed on door frames at a child's level. We sing songs and prayers every day as part of our daily routines. If a child asks to sing a Rosh Hashanah song in February, then that is what we do.

Pictures of us celebrating holidays together remain on the walls of the classrooms. And, language about God's creatures and God's gifts are a constant practice of all our teachers and children. So, as I sit and listen to the sounds of the children singing, praying and playing, I am reminded that being Jewish lives here all year long.


For Daniel's mitzvah project, he's swimming with Swim Across America raising money for pediatric cancer research.

At Etz Chaim, our students in 8th – 12th grades have the opportunity to continue their Jewish learning experiences after Bar and Bat Mitzvah. Through our Chai Five Teen Learning Program, our teens engage in discussions that will continue to strengthen their connection to the synagogue and the rabbis. This is accomplished through a variety of intriguing topics to broaden their Jewish view of themselves, the community and world around them.

Our B'Yachad program for 8th and 9th grades offers a six-session program throughout the year, taught by Rabbi Dan Dorsch and Rabbi Jonathon Adler. The content of the sessions will include the six big events in Jewish history and Jewish literature.

Our Chai Five program has a Confirmation track for students in the tenth grade. This program focuses on the questions the students have, which are guided by the book, Tough Questions Jews Ask, and will culminate with the students leading services on Shabbat morning.

Our students in the 11th and 12th grades join with the USYers during a few "Wacky Wednesdays" throughout the year to discuss leadership, anti-Semitism on college campuses, and maintaining a Jewish connection as they leave home and begin the next step in their journey.
